

St Mary's Catholic Primary School was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for children of Catholic families. The school is conducted by its governing body as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with the trust deed of the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton, its instrument of government, and seeks at all times to be a witness to Jesus Christ. As a Catholic school, the governors aim to provide a Catholic education for all pupils. At a Catholic school, Catholic doctrine and practice permeate every aspect of the school's activity. The governors ask all parents applying for a place to respect this ethos and its importance to the school community.

Although Catholic children have priority for admission, this does not affect the right of applicants who are not Catholic to apply for a place for their children at the school. The school welcomes applications from those of other denominations and faiths, or of none. The school was set up primarily to serve the Catholic community in the parish of Southwick with Portslade.

The governing body is the admissions authority and has responsibility for admissions to this school, including setting the priority of admissions when the school is oversubscribed. The Local Authority undertakes the coordination of admission arrangements during the normal admission round. The governing body has set its admission number at 30 pupils to be admitted to the Reception Year in the school year which begins in September 2024.

Visiting the School

Parents/carers are encouraged to visit our school in order to find out more about how we work and the education we offer.

Becoming a Foundation Governor

Foundation Governors are appointed in the name of the Bishop and form the majority of the governing body of a Catholic school. Governing boards have three core functions:

- Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos, and strategic direction.
- Holding executive leaders to account for the educational performance of the organisation and its pupils, and the performance management of staff.
- Overseeing the financial performance of the organisation and making sure its money is well spent.

If you are interested in being a Foundation Governor, do speak to Fr Tony.

Safeguarding

Everyone has a responsibility for Safeguarding and promoting the wellbeing of vulnerable people. In England and Wales overall responsibility sits with the Bishops' Conference and the Conference of Religious (COR).

The Parish Safeguarding Representative is responsible for: making sure the Parish is aware of the importance of Safeguarding children and vulnerable adults; promoting good and safe practice, including what is appropriate and inappropriate behaviour; with their Parish Priest and the Safeguarding Coordinator, deciding how to administer the National Safeguarding Policies and Procedures within the Parish.

Preparing and Celebrating the Sacraments

One of the key functions of a parish is to offer the Sacraments to people. There are seven Sacraments of the Church: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Marriage, Holy Orders, Anointing of the Sick and Reconciliation. Although sacraments always 'work', so to speak, for us to get the full benefit of the graces and gifts we are given through them requires our own understanding and commitment. So, for most of the sacraments, a period of preparation is needed beforehand. For some of these sacraments we offer that preparation in the parish. For others the preparation will be done in conjunction with other parishes.

Baptism

For children under seven years old, we offer a short course for the parents (and Godparents if they are able to be there), normally over two evenings. Baptisms can either take place as



part of a Sunday Mass or at some other time, usually on a Saturday or Sunday. To discuss all of this, please contact Fr Tony or the parish office.

For children over the age of seven we need to prepare the child for the sacrament as well as the parents. This normally takes place by enrolling the child in the First Holy Communion programme, or even the Confirmation programme if the child is in Year 8 or above. Baptism would then be celebrated shortly before Holy Communion/Confirmation.

Adults seeking Baptism are invited to join the RCIA (see next page).

First Holy Communion & First Reconciliation

Families of children in Year 3 or above who have been baptised in the Catholic Church (or who are preparing to be



Holy Communion preparation programme. We use a programme in which the parents teach their children, with the support of the catechists. In each session we do some things together as a whole group, and other things in family groups. And there is always a break with drinks and biscuits!

The programme normally starts in November, First Reconciliation is generally in late January, and First Holy Communions are usually in May. For more information contact the parish office.

Confirmation

Young people are normally eligible for Confirmation from Year 9. However, if a young person seeks Confirmation earlier than that, and is already actively involved in the Church, then please speak to Fr Tony, as we may accept them at a younger age.



The preparation starts informally, with the candidates being asked to come to Sunday Mass regularly, and to participate in some way beyond just being there – perhaps helping with welcoming, or being a server, or helping with the music or the refreshments after Mass.

Once they have shown a commitment to that, they will be invited to join the more formal preparation, which normally begins in the spring term. This takes place in conjunction with other parishes in Hove. Confirmation normally takes place later in the summer term, at Arundel Cathedral with all the parishes of the deanery. For more details contact Fr Tony.

Adults who have been baptised but not received Confirmation are invited to join the RCIA.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

Adults seeking to join the Catholic Church and receive the 'Sacraments of Initiation' (Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Communion) normally do so through the RCIA. This involves a period of preparation (which depends on the individual) along with others seeking the same thing and some catechists, leading to Baptism, Confirmation and Communion at Easter.

Fr Paul leads the RCIA in the parish. For more information contact the parish office.

Marriage

Couples seeking to get married in the parish, and also couples who live in the parish but are marrying elsewhere, need to contact Fr Tony at the earliest opportunity. The



diocese normally requires one year's notice for marriage in order to allow enough time for preparation of the couple.

Preparation involves a certain amount of paperwork, both civil and ecclesiastical, and also preparation, not just for the wedding, but for married life. This is done in part by Fr Tony and in part through a marriage preparation course with other engaged couples and led by married people.

The Sacrament of the Sick

People sometimes confuse the 'Sacrament of the Sick' (or Anointing of the Sick, sometime abbreviated to Anointing) with the 'Last Rites'. The Last Rites are, in fact, Viaticum



(Holy Communion given to the dying – literally 'food for the journey') and the Prayer of Commendation. Anointing is often given at the same time if there is a priest present (the Communion and Commendation do not require a priest). However it is not limited to that.

The Sacrament of the Sick can be given to anyone with a serious illness, including those with ongoing chronic illness, those who are frail due to age, and anyone going for a surgical operation, especially one that involves a general anaesthetic. The Sacrament can be celebrated as part of Mass, in church outside of Mass, or of course in hospital or at home.

We organise an annual Mass for the Sick, usually around the time of the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, in which the Sacrament of the Sick is conferred on anyone who desires it.

If you or someone you know is going into hospital for any reason, do let us know. Do not assume the hospital will let us know (they will not, unless you ask them – and even then, the message might get lost!). We can then pass that on to the chaplains.

Taking Communion to People at Home

Sometimes people find they are unable to come to church, through frailty, illness, or disability. We have a team of Ministers of Communion who take communion to such people. If you, or anyone you know, would like to receive communion at home, please contact the parish office.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Confessions are scheduled on a Saturday evening before the 5:30 pm Mass (4:45-5:15 pm). In addition Fr Tony is normally willing to hear Confessions after any Mass, in particular after the 11:00 am Mass at St George's. Just ask!



We also have a Penitential Service each Advent and Lent, normally on the afternoon of the 3rd or 4th Sunday of Advent, and on the afternoon of Palm Sunday. This is a short service followed by the opportunity for individual Confession. There are normally two or three priests available for Confession.

Holy Orders

While clearly we do not do formal preparation for the Diaconate or Priesthood in the parish, priests and deacons do not come out of nowhere! We know there are fewer priests than there used to be, though in many ways we are



still quite well off for clergy compared to other parts of the world. Think how many Sunday Masses there are in our deanery (26 including vigil Masses, in 11 churches). We currently have seven parish priests, four retired priests, three Benedictine priests, and two priests with other responsibilities in the deanery. There are also three deacons (one retired). But these numbers will fall in the years to come.

Importantly, our parishes need to be places which encourage and foster vocations. We need to pray for vocations. But we also need to be the kind of community which will inspire vocations. Priests generally come from vibrant, active parishes and communities! If those who might be called to ordained ministry see the clergy constantly battling just to keep things going, they are unlikely to be attracted to offer themselves for ministry as priests or deacons!

If you are thinking about the possibility of ordination as a priest or deacon, do speak to Fr Tony. As he has been involved in the formation of priests himself for most of his own priesthood, he is in a good position to listen to you and support your discernment.

Although entry into religious life (monks and nuns, brothers, and sisters) is not the same as Holy Orders, much of what has been said above also applies to vocations to the religious life. Again feel free to speak to Fr Tony who can give guidance and suggest how you may explore this kind of vocation more deeply.

Children's Liturgy

What is Children's Liturgy?



It is the Liturgy of the Word suitably adapted to make it relevant to the lives and experiences of young children. It gives them the opportunity to understand the Gospel message and participate in the Eucharistic celebration at their own level.

We invite children in school years Reception to Year 3 to join the group.

Where does it take place?

The children celebrate the Liturgy of the Word in a room set apart from the main congregation, at St Theresa's this is in the side chapel. A simple altar with candles and a special place set aside for proclaiming the Word of God help the children appreciate that this is a special time.

When does it take place?

At St Theresa's we have Children's Liturgy sessions during the 9 am Sunday Mass (during term time). The children are present at the beginning of Mass until the end of the Introductory Rites, when Fr Tony invites them to leave for their own celebration. They are brought back into the main church after the Prayers of the Faithful by a member of the liturgy team.

Who leads the Liturgy of the Word for Children?

We have a number of group leaders for this ministry, including teachers and parents from St Mary's School, as well as other members of our Parish. All group leaders have an enhanced DBS check and there will always be two group leaders at each session.

Funerals

Funerals are normally arranged through a funeral director. They will then liaise with the parish, the family, and the cemetery or crematorium in order to arrange the funeral. Some people like to 'plan ahead' as it were. This can include a pre-paid funeral plan. It is also a good idea to let your family know what type of service you would like. Normally, for a Catholic, this would be a Funeral Mass followed by burial or cremation. You might like to select the readings or music in advance. If you would like to do this, you are welcome to speak to Fr Tony for a chat and some guidance. This will also make sure the parish has a record of your desires.

Other Regular Activities in the Parish

While the liturgy is at the heart of what we do, other things do happen in the parish! Here are some of the current parish activities.

Tea and Chat

On the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month, the 10 am Mass at St George's is followed by a time of socialisation and activity aimed at the older people in the parish. No need to book. Just turn up!

Wednesday Evening Faith Formation

In term times, after the 7 pm Mass, there will usually be a time of faith formation, often involving a video, such as the SYCAMORE sessions or the diocesan 'Invited' programme. See the Newsletter for details of what is happening.

Thursday Evening Zoom Prayer Meeting

During the pandemic a group started up a regular meeting of prayer and fellowship online on Thursday evenings. It will resume on Thursday 11th January 2024. If you would like to join in, contact the parish office to be sent a Zoom invitation.

Bollywood Dance and Exercise Class

Not strictly a parish event, but organised by parishioners, in the parish hall, Monday evenings 6:30–7:30 pm. All abilities welcome, including children (Under 18's must be accompanied by a responsible adult). Have Fun — Get Fit — Make Friends!

Churches Together in Southwick

There is a regular prayer meeting on Wednesday mornings, 9:30 am, at St Michael's, Church Road, Southwick, BN42 4DG. People from the local churches take turns to lead. The meeting is half an hour, followed by refreshments and chat.

Getting Involved

Being a member of the Church isn't just about being baptised, what we believe, or going to church, though all these are important. We are all called to live out our discipleship in the Church and in the world. While the primary way we do that is by simply living our faith in our families and in the world, we also need people who will give their time and gifts to enable the running and the mission of the Church in our local area.

Here is a list of some of the ministries, tasks and roles in the parish.

Catechetical Ministries

Catechesis is the ministry of passing on the faith. It involves a certain amount of teaching, and so requires a good basic understanding of your faith. For the most part catechists use professionally prepared material, but they also need to be willing to share their own faith and experience. If you would like to help with one of these, but feel you need to deepen your understanding, we can offer you opportunities for your own formation.

Baptism Preparation

We run a short course to help new parents prepare for their children's Baptism. Currently Fr Tony and Gill Sajnog run this, but a couple more catechists would be useful. Ideally the catechists would be parents themselves.

First Holy Communion

We have a small team of Holy Communion catechists, but we always welcome newcomers!! We use material from a wider programme called *Growing Up Catholic* which primarily involves helping the parents to teach their own children about the faith.

Confirmation

In this diocese, young people are normally invited to prepare for Confirmation while in school Years 9 and upwards. We currently team up with the other Hove parishes for this. If you would like to help with that do let us know. You would need to be comfortable working with young people, and willing to respond honestly and sympathetically to their questions.

Marriage Preparation

We will be setting up a deanery marriage preparation team. There is some excellent diocesan material to help couples prepare for marriage, but we need a team of married couples from across the deanery to deliver it. Could you do this? The diocese will provide appropriate training.

RCIA

RCIA stands for the *Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults*, and the process by which adults approach Baptism and Confirmation and for preparing baptised Christians to be received into the Catholic Church. Fr Paul leads the group, but we also need people who are simply willing to be part of the group and share something of their own faith.

Liturgical Ministries

Liturgical ministries are those which enable us to worthily celebrate the Mass and other sacraments and services in the church. Some are 'up front', some are more 'behind the scenes'.

Readers

The reader proclaims the Word of God from the Scriptures during the Mass and other services. We have a number of people who exercise this ministry, but new voices are always welcome. We put on formation for current and prospective readers from time to time.

Sacristans

The sacristans are the 'backstage crew' of the liturgy. They set up for Mass, deal with lighting and sound, and tidy up afterwards. They also keep an eye on things needed in the church. We have sacristans for most of the Masses (the exception being weekdays at St Theresa's, when Fr Tony often has to do it himself!), but, as ever, more helpers are very welcome.

Musicians & Choir

Music is a very important part of the Liturgy. James has been doing a sterling job of leading the music, but he is moving on! Do you play an instrument? Might you be willing to join a music group? Do you play the piano? Would you be willing to learn the organ? The parish will subsidise organ lessons, no strings attached! (No pun intended.)

Children's Liturgy

We have a Children's Liturgy group at St Theresa's, but more helpers are always welcome. Is anyone willing to help with this at St George's?

Altar Servers

We now have altar servers at St George's, and are hoping to find some at St Theresa's. Perhaps your children might be interested?

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMs)

Now we are returning to offering Communion under both kinds on Sundays, we need ministers to help distribute Communion. We also need people to take Communion to those who are unable to get to Mass.

Welcomers

This is a very important role. It is about making sure everyone feels welcome in the church, especially visitors and newcomers. It involves being sensitive to people's needs, including those who just want to sit quietly at the back. We do have teams of these at all Masses, but it would be good to have more.

Flower Arrangers

The decoration of our churches falls to a few stalwart ladies who do a great job, but more support would be welcome. (Men also welcome!)

Church Cleaners

We put this in liturgical ministry because it makes sure that we have a worthy space in which to worship. We have teams at both churches, but more are always welcome! It is only a couple of hours once a month or so.

Care for Those in Need

Many of the ministries already listed involve an element of care for others, especially EMs. However there are specific groups that focus on that dimension of parish life. The SVP has already been mentioned, but other possibilities include:

CAFOD/Justice and Peace

Many parishes have a group which both reflects on issues of justice and peace, and which promotes awareness, fundraising, and action. This often includes ecological issues such as climate change. CAFOD are often at the forefront of such activity. It would be good to have such a group in the parish. For more on CAFOD see <u>www.cafod.org.uk</u>.

The Food Bank

Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank is based at St George's church hall. They can always use volunteers who can give their time every week, fortnightly, once a month, or in the holidays. See <u>hangletonfoodbank.org</u> for more information.

The Welcome Directory

The Welcome Directory is a list of places of worship where former prisoners know they will be welcomed. We would like to set this up at one or both of our churches, but we need a few people at each church to undergo the online training and be willing to be a point of contact. Other Jobs and Roles

Social Committee

We do not have a Social Committee yet, but we think one would be useful. If you would like to be part of such a group, please let the office know.

Counters

There are money counting teams at St George's and St Theresa's, but more counters are always useful! It takes about 20 minutes after the Sunday Mass.

Refreshments after Mass and other events

We have good teams at both churches, but more help is always welcome.

Catering

From time to time we aspire to more than drinks, cakes, and biscuits. Unfortunately, we lack a proper kitchen at either church. Can you offer catering skills occasionally? All expenses would be met.

Craft Skills

Sometimes we need things mended or even made. Do you have any artistic, needlework, woodwork, metalwork, or other skills that we might call on occasionally?

There are many other skills we could use also, for example youth work, gardening, social media, tech support, notice boards, photography, etc. etc. Feel free to let us know if you have any talents you would be willing to share.
